



# **How Does Solitary Confinement Effect** Youth In Adult Facilities?

Nearly one third of those held in solitary confinement have one or more pre-existing conditions<sup>1</sup>





# **Regression Rather Than Reformation?**



## **Cost VS Benefit:**

Supermax prisons relying more heavily on the use of solitary confinement<sup>3</sup> are typically 2-3 times more expensive<sup>4</sup> to build and maintain than traditional prisons

The cost to keeping an individual in solitary confinement is roughly 42% higher<sup>5</sup> than being in the general population

Looking at the respondents and the time reported highlights the varying degree to which races are subjected to solitary confinement 73% of African Americans had been in solitary confinement for an average of 96 days


